The view from here

Elsie Kanza

Taking on a continental challenge

Elsie Kanza is the Director and Head of Africa for the World Economic Forum – an independent international organisation committed to improving the state of the world by engaging business, political, academic and other leaders of society to shape global, regional and industry agendas. So she's a highly influential figure in steering Africa's future. That's a lot to take on, but after talking to Elsie about her life and work, it's clear what set her on such an important path – and why she's ideal for the job.



We caught up with Elsie in Nigeria, where she found a gap in her demanding schedule to discuss her role in securing Africa's opportunities for sustainable economic growth – and, of course, her studies through the University of Strathclyde.

What inspired you to get out there and make a difference?

I was born in Tanzania – at the time a socialist country – but went to school in Kenya, which was essentially capitalist. I then studied my Masters in Finance in Tanzania, through the University of Strathclyde. I think I was already a very driven person, thanks to my upbringing and my parents' support, but to see such disparity between neighbouring countries – and know that it's the same across the continent – made me want to do something positive about it. I guess I grew up as a 'foreigner' in many ways, travelling between two very different countries, so I had a unique perspective on things – and the support and opportunity to do something with it.

You say your involvement with the University of Strathclyde was a very formative time for you

Yes, it was. In 1996, while I was studying for my University of Strathclyde Masters remotely at the Institute of Financial Management in Dar es Salaam, Strathclyde was collaborating with the Institute on an educational development programme. In many ways, this further established my passion for technology, innovation and education – and confirmed my desire to help address Africa's skills gap. Africa has great potential for growth, but improving education across the countries is one of the keys to its success.

What do you see as Africa's main challenges over the next 10 years?

Sustainable economic growth will only be possible if we invest in education, infrastructure and food security. These three things must come first, and form the foundation on which Africa can seize its opportunities and fulfil some of its outstanding potential.

Also, African people's expectations keep rising when they see their country and continent in context, and compare their lives with others. This is a good motivation for success, but managing expectations is crucial to getting it right. It's about patience, and slow but steady growth, and my team and I are working continuously to establish that.

What advice would you give to graduates embarking on new careers?

Stay open-minded, and make sure you're there when the opportunities arise, but also stay focused and consistent. University gives you a foundation, and working life provides the experience that lets you put theory into practice, and this isn't always instant, so be patient. Remember, everyone will influence you – professors, family, friends and colleagues. And pay attention to what potential employers will find useful. One day, that employer may be you...

Elsie is currently preparing for the 2014 World Economic Forum on Africa, which will be held in West Africa for the first time, in Nigeria. Nigeria is one of Africa's fastest growing economies, and the second largest in Sub-Saharan Africa, behind South Africa.

In the meantime, her calendar for the rest of 2013 will take her throughout Eastern, Southern and Western Africa, continuing her inspirational work.



David Livingstone's 200th birthday

That's a lot of candles on the cake...

This year, we celebrate the life and achievements of one of our most notable alumni. Medical missionary and explorer David Livingstone has become a renowned figure in Scottish history for his expeditions, research and campaigns against slavery – in his travels through Africa, and in particular, Malawi. His research into malaria and sleeping sickness helped establish treatments and preventative techniques used to this day.

The links David Livingstone established between Scotland and Africa have helped us build strong relations over the years with the University of Malawi – most recently through the collaborative Malawi Millennium Project.



Cathy Yao – leading the way

Our first graduate through the Hopewell Scholarship Sir Gordon Wu is a leading global businessman from Hong Kong with an Honorary Doctorate of Business Administration (DBA) from Strathclyde. His company, Hopewell Holdings, has interests in infrastructure, engineering, property, hotels and energy, while his Hopewell Scholarship at Strathclyde mirrors similar schemes at North American universities. Launched here in 2009, its first scholar, Cathy Yao, graduated this July with a First-class Honours degree.

Cathy also won the A W Scott Prize, for achieving the best marks by a final-year Honours student in Chemical Engineering.





Keeping it world-class

A £34.2 million boost for Strathclyde's manufacturing research centre

There's some pretty special research going on at the Strathclyde-led EPSRC Centre for Innovative Manufacturing in Continuous Manufacturing and Crystallisation. For example, ensuring affordable medicines and speeding up the drug development process. And thanks to a £11.4 million cash injection – plus £22.8 million of industry and charity contributions – the good work is set to continue.

Chancellor of the Exchequer, George Osborne, personally endorsed the move, saying: "By bringing together our Nobel Prize-winning scientists, our world-class companies and our entrepreneurial start-ups, we can create the economic dynamism Britain needs to win the global race."

CIAA – an intelligence agency with a difference

Getting back on track with young entrepreneurs




Strathclyde Business Fellows Network

Victoria, a recent graduate of Strathclyde's Department of Design, Manufacturing and Engineering Management (DMEM), won the undergraduate category at Santander Universities Entrepreneurship Awards. Her innovative knee-protector, designed to reduce the risk of osteoarthritis, sealed the deal – and helped her beat competition from 66 other hopefuls.

Strathclyde's partnership with Santander Universities is giving students invaluable exposure to world-class research, and helping young innovators like Victoria find the opportunities they deserve. Victoria is also enjoying support from the Strathclyde Entrepreneurial Network, and is already well on the way to market with her winning technology.

In July this year, Victoria was awarded £50,000 in business funding for her product through the Scottish Institute for Enterprise's Young Innovators Challenge.

A prestigious literary award

Emeritus Professor Zoe Wicomb's talent receives top praise

Strathclyde alumna Zoe Wicomb is a South African author currently living in Glasgow. Her critical focus is on post-colonial theory, and South African writing and culture. Judges at the inaugural William-Campbell literature awards at Yale University in the US hailed Zoe's "subtle, lively language, and beautifully created narratives."

Travel notes

Helene Norman-Dupuy

Well travelled and high-flying – in more ways than one

Marketing specialist Helene Norman-Dupuy's career travel itinerary looks much like an airport departures board – taking in Glasgow, Manchester, Brussels, Paris, her native Oslo, and many places in between. Which is kind of poetic, because Helene has just decided to change career completely and train to be a pilot.

First stop: Strathclyde

Upon finishing high school in Norway, Helene decided she'd like to study in the UK, and travelled the land by coach to visit five potential universities. "I went everywhere, from Bristol all the way up to Glasgow," she explains. "But in the end it was an easy decision. I chose Strathclyde because there was a better choice of marketing courses, a strong international student scene, and a great sense of community. I really took to it straight away."

"As far as the course goes, I was really impressed by the module options available, and I wanted to do them all! In fact, I achieved 18 credits in my second year, instead of just the 12 required."

Over the border, then over the North Sea

After completing her marketing degree in 1996, Helene went to work for industrial firm Ingersoll Rand in Manchester, working her way up from Marketing Assistant to Marketing Manager in less than four years. "I worked a lot with one of Ingersoll Rand's parts groups in Africa, so there was a fair bit of travel involved, and I gained a lot of valuable experience in industrial markets in different countries and regions. At the time, Ingersoll Rand had just merged with Bobcat, the US-based construction equipment manufacturer, and in 2000 I moved to Brussels to manage the Ingersoll Rand and Bobcat parts account."

A brief interlude, and then...

Helene took time out in 2000 to start a family, but by 2002 she was back in the marketing game – this time working for EIM Rail in Brussels. "This was a bit of a change, as I was selling ideas, not parts," says Helene. "It was more of a communications role in rail infrastructure than straight sales, so it was really interesting."

Popping back to Strathclyde

Then, in 2004 Transport and Logistics firm DB Schenker – at the time known as English, Welsh and Scottish Railway (EWS) – recruited Helene to manage accounts in the UK and Spain, and for its subsidiary Euro Cargo Rail, in France. "This meant lots more travelling around, and often visiting the UK," says Helene. "In fact, this gave me the opportunity to visit the University of Strathclyde, as I'd sometimes play golf at Gleneagles with some of our Scottish clients. It was great to visit my old department, which has transformed since my studies there, meet up with friends from my university days, and see how the city has changed – it still has a wonderful cultural vibe."

All change



Onwards, and this time, upwards

Helene has just taken another new direction. But this time it's a radical change. "I'm realising a lifelong ambition to become a professional pilot," she announces. "I've relocated my family back to my hometown, Oslo, and it just feels like the right time to do something completely different. So here I am, full circle to where it all started 22 years ago – just before I went to study at Strathclyde. Who knows where the next chapter will take me..."

Scotland's educational powerhouse continues to lead the way, and in 2012 we were recognised for our growing status as one of the world's best.

The University of Strathclyde was crowned UK University of the Year – an accolade made possible largely by our exciting programme of research initiatives and industry engagement.

Here we take a look at some of the reasons that secured the win, how we've strengthened our prestigious status over recent years, and how it sets us up for an even brighter future.

At the forefront of positive change

More and more leading researchers and strategic partners are getting behind the Technology and Innovation Centre as it nears completion. The new centre brings academics, industry and business partners together to address the important technological challenges facing society.



Scottish ingenuity shines

Earlier this year, we opened the Power Networks Demonstration Centre – a multimillion-pound electricity grid research centre. It has been established in response to growing demands for secure, reliable and environmentally-friendly electricity across the planet.



Deeper understanding of what helps businesses grow

Strathclyde is set to play an integral role in a new £2.9 million research centre designed to help boost business growth for small and medium-sized enterprises. The Enterprise Research Centre, hosted by Warwick and Aston Universities, will develop understanding of the factors affecting business investment, performance and growth.



Creating the future now

More ground-breaking research can be expected, now that Fraunhofer Gesellschaft, Europe's largest organisation for applied research, has created the Fraunhofer Centre for Applied Photonics. The Centre opened officially in April and is a focal point for laser research and technology in sectors including healthcare, security, energy and transport.



Forging industrial success

We're also expanding our Advanced Forming Research Centre (AFRC), a first-rate research base for forming and forging techniques. It is doubling in size thanks to a multimillion-pound investment, and by the end of 2013 will include a range of workshops, laboratories, and office space.

What's it like studying at the UK University of the Year?

We spoke to Marketing and Human Resource Management student Amanda McFadden about her experiences here, and what the accolade does for her and her career.

Amanda, who has been on placement with dynamic spirits company Maxxium UK, working alongside brand managers on a wide range of projects, was recently named Marketing Student of the Year at the Marketing Society Awards 2013. As she returns to Strathclyde to undertake year four of her undergraduate studies, she gives us some insights into studying at the University, and her perspectives on our well-earned status:



A sense of greatness

"I'm not surprised Strathclyde received this great honour. I came here to study in 2010, based on the Business School's already superb reputation," she says. "You can't help notice there's a lot of really positive stuff going on across the University. From my perspective, the industry links and career opportunities are particularly impressive. My placement really lays the foundation for a successful fourth year here, and I've learned so much and met some excellent contacts at Maxxium UK. My experience with them will inform my dissertation, and who knows – I hope I'll be involved with Maxxium UK in some capacity in the future. They recruit actively from Strathclyde, because the calibre of graduates is so high, and it makes such a difference to know the relationship is so mutually beneficial."

"The staff here are so enthusiastic and supportive. I think the air of positivity and devotion to being the best is infectious – and from my own experience I know that links with industry, and supporting graduates' career paths are a big part of Strathclyde's success and appeal."

What it means to be Marketing Student of the Year

"Professor Alan Wilson put me forward for the Marketing Society Awards, and I'd like to thank him for that. It's another 'wow' factor for Strathclyde Business School that it encourages students like me so much. On the night, I had no idea I'd won until they read out my name. Just being on the shortlist was a great accomplishment for me, so to win was initially a shock, but it sank in as the night progressed. I had the opportunity to network with a wide range of marketing professionals, which was really useful, and I'm so lucky to have won the three-month paid internship."

"If you'd asked me before I came to study here, I couldn't have predicted such a positive experience. But it's been great – and it isn't over yet!"

Dr Andrew Spyrou has had quite the life. Since his days at the Royal Technical College, one of Strathclyde's predecessor institutions, his naval engineering career has taken him all over the world. Since the beginning of the Second World War, when he just made it to Glasgow from his Greek homeland, he has had a huge influence on the safety and success of commercial shipping.

As I remember it

The man who shaped commercial shipping

Along the way, Dr Spyrou has brushed shoulders with the likes of Winston Churchill and Jacqueline Kennedy through his personal and professional association with shipping magnate Aristotle Onassis.

His contribution to safety at sea, and to the efficiency and magnitude of fleets operating all over the world's oceans – and his pioneering work towards more environmentally sustainable operations – is quite staggering. And he's still going strong, publishing books and speaking with infectious enthusiasm for his lifelong passion.

We spoke to this humble, eloquent man recently, from his Greek home. The interview could have gone on for hours – days, even. Here are some highlights from our interview as we look back over his career, and where it all began with the University of Strathclyde.

What was Glasgow like when you arrived here 74 years ago? And what about the University?

"I had just received my scholarship from the Greek government to study at the Royal Technical College, which is now the University of Strathclyde, as the war started. So getting here in the first place was a struggle. I only secured a place on the grain ship that brought me here via Lisbon and Belfast, thanks to my knowledge of shipping! This was in 1939, just as the Second World War broke out. Glasgow struck me as a beautiful place, and the Clyde was thriving on its shipbuilding industry – but for this reason it was under continuous threat from bombing as the war progressed. Nevertheless, I completed my Honours Degree in Naval Architecture a year early, in 1944 thanks to the support of 'Daddy' Gray, a professor of the College. I met my wife Anne there, too."

Having spearheaded several environmental initiatives in commercial shipping – many well ahead of their time – how do you see the future?

"Well, ships sailed the world for centuries before we had internal combustion, steam or electricity. I think wind power will play a big part in the future of shipping, as we reduce our dependence on fossil fuels and treat the natural environment more responsibly. For example, as well as for propulsion, we can convert wind power to electricity for a wide range of uses. What's more, the technology for capturing and converting solar power more efficiently is coming on in leaps and bounds, so this will also play a part. The Norwegians are currently working on some very impressive solar power technology for shipping, which I follow with great interest."



How does it feel to look back and know you've been so instrumental in 'shaping shipping'?

"My link-up with Mr Onassis and his business acumen was the key. Over 30 years with him, I helped expand his fleet from three small ships to the largest in the world. I designed his renowned super-yacht 'Christina' and the first ever million-ton oil carrier, and I'm very proud of how I helped improve facilities and working conditions in shipyards. I've always been an advocate of greener ways of doing things, so I hope some of my initiatives for solar and wind power, and more efficient use of fossil fuels, have played a part in today's shift towards more planet-friendly commercial shipping."

Dr Andrew Spyrou has written notable books on commercial shipping and environmental issues since 1982. They have been translated into several languages, and are widely accepted as authoritative texts on many important issues.




